
# South Carolina Inclusion Collaborative

Stephanie McAvoy and Dallas Yoshida, Pyramid PIECES: Enhancing Emotional Literacy through Evidence Based Practices to Build Healthy Social and Emotional Development for Young Children Session Description/Objectives During this session, we will discuss the meaning of emotional literacy and what it looks like and sounds like in early childhood classrooms who focus on emotional literacy. Effective practices that will be discussed during this session include classroom displays featuring emotional expressions, direct teaching, games and songs, books, feelings check-ins, and talking about feelings throughout the day. Examples of each practice being implemented in the classroom will be discussed as well. Key considerations when teaching emotional literacy will also be discussed. These include digging deeper into talking about positive and negative emotions and teaching children how to manage difficult emotions. We will present the information with minilectures, videos of practices being used, discussion of examples and a gallery walk of materials that can be used in the classroom.
